## MONKEYFLOWER RANCH

Royal Oaks, Monterey County Award Amount: \$98,830

Rebecca King manages Monkeyflower Ranch, a 40-acre farm located in Royal Oaks. She raises dairy sheep on 30 acres of pasture, as well as hogs, chickens and lambs. Rebecca began her commercial milking and cheese production in 2009.

In 2017 she received a Healthy Soils demonstration grant to apply compost to their pastures and plant hedgerows to help prevent erosion of her sandy soils. Every winter, Rebecca noticed that after big storms, soil would wash down the sloped fields onto the road.

Hedgerows (woody shrubs, trees and bushes with extensive root systems) help minimize erosion because the roots stabilize the soil even during large rain events that may become more frequent and intense with climate change. In addition, the plants provide shade for her animals, attract pollinators, and increase wildlife habitat. They also capture moisture from fog banks, and their roots create channels for water to move into the soil profile and increase soil moisture levels.
